REMEMBRANCE

My theme for November covers two very different aspects of “Remembrance”.

The dictionary definition of Remembrance is “Remembering or being remembered, memory, recollection.” Remembrance Day, or Armistice Day, on the 11th of November, has been observed by Commonwealth member states since the end of the First World War to remember those of the armed forces who died in the line of duty. It is also called “Poppy Day”. Poppies, one of the only plants to grow on the barren battlefields after World War 1, came to represent the immeasurable sacrifice made by the brave soldiers and quickly became a lasting memorial to those who died in that war and later conflicts.

Remembrance Day has been observed every year since 1919 with a two-minute silence at 11am. This year the British Legion are asking the nation to “pause – mute your phone, close your laptop, switch off the telly and head to your doorsteps to take part in the two-minute silence paying your respects to our Armed Forces community past and present.”

Remembrance Sunday is held in the UK on the second Sunday in November. It commemorates the contribution of British and Commonwealth military and civilian service men and women in the two world wars and later conflicts. This year the annual Remembrance Sunday march past the cenotaph will not take place, instead a Government-led service at the Cenotaph will go ahead as a closed ceremony. Local Remembrance events are permitted with a limited gathering and must comply with local restrictions in place at the time. My second aspect of Remembrance is remembering things that have happened in 2020 due to COVID-19.

Who cannot remember the services and celebrations marking the 75th Anniversaries of the end of the Second World War in Europe and in Japan but also etched into our minds are the horrific scenes shown of the battlefields?

Who cannot remember Captain Tom as he walked 100 times up and down his garden to raise money for the NHS. His effort encouraged others of all ages to undertake challenges to also raise money for charities. We stood outside our houses and clapped for the NHS and all the other key workers who have kept going for the benefit of us all.

I remember the hours each week talking on the phone; the WhatsApp conversations; and members of the Creative Stitch Group, of which I am a member, pasting photos of their amazing work. I remember the first hugs from my grandchildren, Madison and Hollie; the bird song which accompanied the part of Steve and Linda's service held in their garden. I remember people moving out of the way when out walking and the thanks and smiles for doing so. There were many more families out walking or cycling together. I have had time to look around at the world around me and I am amazed at what I've seen.

BUT I know that millions of people in the UK and all around the world who will have had very many different memories. Going onto Reuters News Website, I saw photo after photo along with headlines of the terrible things happening all over the world. It is truly heart breaking. Whilst giving thanks to God for the good things that have happened, we MUST remember in our prayers those friends and strangers all over the world who have suffered tremendously in so many different ways so far in 2020.

CHURCH MEETING

At our recent Church Meeting the redevelopment of the buildings was raised.

A feasibility study had been prepared by architect Colin Wilcox (who had handled the redevelopment of Lillington URC). Our biggest issue is the number of different levels in our current building (at least 13) which do not make it user friendly from an accessibility point of view. In addition to the number of levels the topography of the land is awkward in that it slopes downward from Union Road and downward towards the Warwick Road.

The architect's basic recommendation was that the best way forward is to demolish and rebuild. The Elders support this view. However, there are options as to how this should be achieved given our current needs and the available budget. At the Church Meeting it was proposed and accepted that we create a "Buildings Group" to review the work that has been undertaken to date and to take the matter forward. Some of the work that has been undertaken to date is on display at the rear of the church.

We are holding a further Church Meeting after worship on 22 November at which one of the agenda items will be to confirm the "Buildings Group". SOCIALISING AT CHURCH

We have missed being able to see each other through the long months of lockdown, but now that the church has re-opened for worship we must continue to exercise considerable restraint in how we socialise after worship.

It is a requirement that after worship we move outside as quickly as is safely possible.

Once outside, we must still keep 2 metres apart even whilst enjoying conversation. Please avoid standing for a chat where others will need to walk past you within 2 metres.

We must not meet in groups larger than 6 indoors or outdoors, and we should not move from group to group – the Government are asking us to “limit how many different people you see socially over a short period of time.” Not only will you be liable for a fine (fixed penalty notice) if you breach the “Rule of Six”, you will be giving a very bad witness to anyone who walks past the church and sees a large group of people standing outside talking.

Please leave the church premises quickly after worship, and keep in touch with your friends through the week by telephone or online. We’ve all been disturbed by the predictions of cases doubling every week or so – let us be scrupulously careful not to be responsible for adding to the numbers, or to put ourselves at unnecessary risk.

Remember that the great majority of members at Solihull are at greater risk of developing serious illness should they catch Coronavirus, because of age and health condition. By keeping our distance – physically rather than emotionally – we will be loving our neighbour as we love ourselves.
