FOREWORD – FORGIVENESS AND RECONCILIATION

We must all have been thinking about the countries suffering from the effects of wars around the world at the moment, and in particular in Ukraine. I went to a talk at the Catholic Church in Dorridge about the situation in Ukraine. The talk was given by a man from that church, and he had recently returned from Ukraine. He had taken a van load of donations, including clothing, food and medical supplies and 'cash', to help displaced families escaping from the horrors in their home towns.

He described the crowds at the railway stations, mainly women and children, who had only what they could carry. He gave the example of people who could not afford to buy food or to use the toilets (for which there was a charge), because they had no cash, since money donated was not made available to those individual people in these difficult situations.

When we say the Lord's Prayer, we ask that our sins should be forgiven. Forgiveness can be at a number of levels such as national (between countries), local (between neighbours) and personal (family). In order to have genuine forgiveness there needs to be a means of reconciliation, i.e. forgiveness by both parties.

In Ephesians 2, we can read that God has brought peace by making Jews and Gentiles 'one' people. He will bring peace and even though we cannot see that at the moment, we must have faith and continue to pray for all those affected by wars and strife throughout the world. Without reconciliation, forgiveness is just part of the solution, and yet reconciliation is the hardest part to achieve without God's help.

Let us pray for the end of conflicts in all parts of the world, for forgiveness, and most of all for reconciliation.

CHRISTIAN PERSECUTION IS A GLOBAL REALITY

At least 340 million Christians around the world experience systematic discrimination, unfair treatment and persecution. That means 1 in 8 Christians are affected by 'extreme', 'very high' or 'high' levels of persecution in 74 countries.

Open Doors assembles a list of the top 50 where there is the most extreme persecution and asks us to pray for them.

This month: India

Hindu extremists believe that all Indians should be Hindus, and that the country should be rid of Christians. Extremists particularly target Christians from a Hindu background. These believers are often physically attacked and sometimes killed, as well as being under constant pressure from their family and community to return to Hinduism.

Anti-conversion laws (currently in 9 states, with more considering adoption) are also abused to intimidate Christians.

Pray

- Praise God that many are coming to faith in India through miraculous healings and courageous witness
- For protection from attack for Indian believers, particularly new Christians
- For courage, wisdom and protection for Christian partners helping those most in need

CHURCH GROWTH (CONTINUED FROM LAST MONTH)

There is a subtlety about planning to grow, sometimes called the principle of obliquity. You don't aim directly at the outcome you want—growth. Rather you aim to produce the conditions in which God is able to grow the church—quality and relevance. Churches in which quality and relevance have been improved seem able to grow naturally up to the new higher ceiling level the improvements have created. Then further improvements are required to get to the next stage, and so on.

So the way to grow is not through an endless series of gimmicks to attract people to one-off events but through a steady focuses on the range and quality of church life. A growth plan may seek to improve the quality of worship services and the range of people who will fit into it and the quality of the church hall and the range of users of it.

A balanced plan will involve an intention to grow in all three aspects of depth, numbers and service to the community. Churches that grow in one aspect only become deformed, unbalanced and dysfunctional.

It is no surprise to learn that having a thought-out plan for mission grows the church. But there may be further potential because many churches still lack a sense of urgency to get better at what they do. In other sectors of life this sense of urgency drives progress or competition will swallow you up if you don't keep learning and improving. Most churches spend too little time seeking new vision, and researching new possibilities. In many manufacturing companies, for example, research and development is the main activity not a peripheral one. Few churches invest significantly in training even though their members are their main asset. Successful businesses recognise it is their people who create success and will invest in them to produce it. Finally, not many churches are good at reviewing progress and thereby completing the learning loop by using the lessons learned from review to inform future vision and strategy.

Churches of course are not businesses. But they are not less than businesses, they are more than businesses, with more dimensions to their life. Mission planning will realise its full potential when it is the driver not just of what we do but also of the desire to do it better.
