### **USED POSTAGE STAMPS**

In early February I sent a large packet of used stamps to the RNIB as agreed. I asked them if they would give me some information about what happens to the stamps when they are sent from the agency which handles them. I will keep you informed.

The packet I sent weighed over 600 grams (including packaging) which made me think there were probably more than a thousand stamps in it. Next time I will weigh them more accurately.

Other collectors from years ago were Roy Thompson and Gordon Straight, Roy exhibited at exhibitions and won prizes in competitions. An interesting and educational hobby which flourished until electronic gadgetry appeared. ## HELPING HANDS FOODBANK

Whilst I have had a little bit less to do with the building being closed I have been working for 2 hours a week for the Helping Hands foodbank in Solihull. It is run by Renewal church on Lode Lane. I wondered if you would like to hear a little bit about it as it is where our harvest gifts go each year.

As an ex factory site they have plenty of room and the area next to the worship space is a dedicated warehouse. There is rear access for lorries to reverse right up to the door for deliveries and loading. Most of their produce is given by supermarkets in bulk and the gifts that were given last harvest time by the likes of you and I are long gone. Harvest donations during lockdown were much lower than in other years as schools etc didn't make a collection as usual.

The foodbank give out 3 different types of packages – those for people with a conventional cooker, those for people who only have a microwave and those for people in bed and breakfast accommodation who can only 'cook' using a kettle. As well as food they provide cleaning and personal hygiene essentials, nappies and pet food as well (though pet food is very rarely asked for and Renewal receive more than they need).

People donate plenty of teabags but rarely jars of coffee – the shelf is nearly always bare. And people rarely give sugar – again the shelf is nearly always bare. Jars of pasta sauce, kidney and baked beans are the most given items and there are loads and loads of those in stock. Multi packs of anything are acceptable but catering size tins or packets are of no use. Also items should have as long as possible until the use by date. Each day a morning and afternoon volunteer team of 4 people stack the shelves of the incoming produce and pack the boxes, and bags, for the donations to go out again. Fresh produce (such as bread and potatoes), which the church buys each week, is packed on the day for the number of packages which are to go out. The packages are designed to last a week and I estimate the total packages are worth £50-60, more for a family. The recipients are identified by referral agencies who are helping with accessing benefits and other statutory help people are entitled to so hopefully one week's food should be

enough. There are about 10-25 packages sent out twice a day five days a week, delivered by additional volunteer teams. Renewal have wheelie bins outside their building where donations can be given all year round.

## LIFE ON MARS

Who does not know the iconic lyrics “The chances of anything coming from Mars are a million to one, he said.”

Well, thanks to the successful landing of the robot Perseverance we are going to get something, albeit not for another 10 years. Rock samples, which could reveal that at some time in the planet’s history there was some form of life.

I was clearing photos and videos out of my mobile phone the other day when I came across a photograph I took at the Burlington Quarry in Great Langdale last October of a plaque describing the beautiful green stone that they have been quarrying there for years. It originates from the Ordovician Period and was laid down some 450 million years ago.

I decided last month to enlist the help of a friend of mine who is a geologist and it transpires that the Ordovician Period gave way to the Silurian Period as part of what is known as a Mass Extinction. This was one of five unusually large extinctions involving the demise of vast numbers of species.

Scientists are split between climate change and large comets or asteroids striking Earth as the triggers for the Mass Extinctions. I asked my friend if we were currently in a Period and apparently, we are in the Quaternary Period which commenced about 2.7 million years ago and is divided into 2 or 3 epochs, the earliest being the Pleistocene which ended about 11,700 years ago and is associated with the Ice Age.

We are now in the Holocene epoch BUT some scientists are arguing that because of global warming there has been such a shift in the environment that we should now be in a new age called the Anthropocene which they argue began circa 1800 with the Industrial Revolution.

What is strikingly obvious to everyone is that we are on a downward slope as far as the custody of our own Planet Earth is concerned and we only have ourselves to blame as we, Homo Sapiens, are the single most destructive species in existence.


Planet Earth and Planet Mars are of the same age and my hope is that when we get the chance to analyse the rock samples brought back from Mars we may be able to add to our knowledge and understanding of the Red Planet. Did it once have some form of life, did it have Periods, did it have Mass Extinctions and if so why is it now a dustbowl? Will we be shocked?
