#### **MINISTRY UPDATE**

I would like to bring the Fellowship up to date on the question of finding a Minister for our Church.

As we have no Minister at the moment we are allocated an Interim Moderator. This is Graham Sweeney who is the Area Minister for SE Birmingham and Solihull. Graham joined the Elders Meeting on 6th February.

Graham expressed his pleasure at being able to attend the meeting and apologised for his recent inactivity due to the surgery on his hand. He stressed that his role as our Interim Moderator really only became important once we were declared "In Vacancy". A precursor to this was the creation of our Pastoral Profile which we were able to confirm had recently been updated and was now available.

Graham confirmed that the strategy for SE Birmingham and Solihull remained the same in that one Full Time Minister was to be allocated with support from Fiona Elvins who is a Non Stipendiary Minister. The Full Time Minister would be based at SURC who would enjoy an 80% Scope. Whilst this was apparently an unchanged strategy, it was all news to the Elders but obviously well received. The vacancy at SURC is regarded as a priority.

The next stage was for SURC to submit their Pastoral Profile for consideration by The Ministerial Development Committee which is made up of 15 members including Church Staff. Graham assisted the Elders in a discussion to finalise the Pastoral Profile which was e-mailed the following day by LF to both Graham and the West Midlands Synod Office. Speed was of the essence as The Ministerial Development Committee (MDC) which approves the Profile only meets four times a year and the papers for their next meeting had to be available by Wednesday 8th February. Assuming their approval the next stage in the process will involve debate at The Central Moderators Meeting and SURC will then formally be deemed "In Vacancy". They will seek to match a Minister to the Profile and it will be a month before any names are made public.

It is at this stage that Graham's role assumes its main function as he assists the Elders in their deliberations. Only Church Members can vote on the calling of the candidate and the Elders will determine the level of % vote that will be deemed appropriate. Initial feelings were that it should be in the region of 75% to 80% in favour. Arrangements would be made for those participating on Zoom.

The Elders will keep you informed as things develop.

#### TOWARDS A THEOLOGY OF CHURCH GROWTH

Last month I told you about a book that I am reading with the above title and how useful that I am finding it. I said that there was a good deal for us all of which to take note. I shared a few thoughts from the Archbishop of Canterbury from the foreword and today I am going to share just 5 of the bits that I made a note of from the introduction.

Some of the ideas might come up again as we progress through the book but I noted them at this point of the book and so will share them here. These are relevant to us so I have added a question to think about.

"Growth in the Christian church is never just about 'bums on seats'. The New Testament is about God's Kingly rule, into which the church has to fit—and which is not co-terminous with the church. The Gospel is incarnate in the small and overlooked as much as the large and spectacular. And 'church growth' is a wide concept. One influential definition sees growth in the church life as a three-fold balance, entailing growth in personal holiness, growth in societal transformation and the numerical growth of church congregations."

QUESTION FOR SOLIHULL URC: Does our church life suggest that we take all three of these seriously?

"It remains a truth, almost universally acknowledged, that the church, so defined, in the modern west is in decline. But there is now, considerable empirical evidence to show that this assertion is a serious over statement. The church may be declining in places, but it is growing in many others."

QUESTION FOR SOLIHULL URC: Do we buy into the wrong assumption that decline in the church is 'inevitable'? How do our assumptions affect the way we organise our church in Solihull?

Looking at the New Testament (M Bonnington), "Personal conversion, community formation and lifestyle change were intertwined. Proclamation and conversion led people to change their lifestyles—and such change was crucial to the growth of churches, for conversion was a high commitment activity, particularly for the gentiles: A slave converted wanted to go out early or late to meet other believers. He made up for it by working harder. A household converted and the household gods disappeared from the corner of the room. The master avoided the temples but instead invited people to dine with him at his house. When he did so he omitted the traditional libation to his guild's divinity but instead thanked the God of heaven for the meal. Insider and outsider alike knew something had changed and the reasons why were freely on offer."

QUESTION FOR SOLIHULL URC: How distinctly do we live our lives as Christians today in Solihull or do we just accept the ways 'everyone' is living and join in?

Looking at the Incarnation and church Growth (M Warner) "Healthy well-functioning churches are places where people can be restored and become agents of change and renewal within the world beyond the church. The reason we need churches to grow is not to pay the bills, or to feel good about ourselves. It is to enable humanity, in tune with the Spirit of God, to fulfil its divine calling to care for and nurture the world which God has created."

QUESTION FOR SOLIHULL URC: What do you think are good motivating reasons for us to seek church growth in Solihull URC?

#### LIFE'S JOURNEY

I am pleased to say that I am making good progress although it will take quite a while before I am back to 'normal'!


