November is a time when we remember all those who lost their lives in wars. Remembrance Day is important as it highlights the horror of war and ideally it should help us to stop conflict, but does it do that? Of course not, there are conflicts going on in many parts of the world, people are still suffering pain, both physical and mental. We must remember, but more importantly we must forgive.

This year, for the first time, the British Legion has defined Remembrance Sunday as acknowledging: 'The sacrifice of the Armed Forces Community from Britain and the Commonwealth' and 'the innocent civilians, who have lost their lives in conflict and acts of terrorism'.

Have you ever visited the National Memorial Arboretum at Alrewas? If not, do try and go there. It is a very moving experience. Every day they hold two minutes silence in the chapel at 11am and a light shines on the Altar and visitors are invited to stand still as they remember all those lost in conflict.

On an individual note: We must think of our own disagreements and arguments. We must try to live our lives without conflict with each other. We must listen to others and 'agree to differ' remembering that there is always more than one opinion on both important and trivial issues. We must forgive, even if we cannot forget. We must forgive as God forgives us.

When we say the Lord's Prayer, we must mean what we say and not just say it by rote: 'Forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us'.

As we think about those who have given so much, let us also think of our own lives and ask God to help us to treat others as we would want to be treated, as Jesus treated those around him, with love and compassion.

UPDATE FROM LONGBRIDGE RETIREMENT VILLAGE

The pleasant summer has allowed the garden to flourish more than the hot dry weather did last year. The many gardeners here are each responsible for a small bed, and the result has been very colourful. Also, most people have attractive displays on their balconies, and a competition was held; a nice photographic display followed. The Sensory garden is now in operation, the necessary arbours, raised beds and trellis fences being provided by men who enjoy woodwork, with the planting mostly done by ladies.

The sixty plus volunteers here are rewarded with an annual Volunteers' Party, which this year was attended by the Lord Mayor of Birmingham who expressed his thanks on behalf of the staff. Being able to volunteer gives purpose to one's daily life as well as providing lots of activities which otherwise the staff could not cope with. One such activity looks after pre-school children (often the grandchildren of residents) for one morning a week. It is good to mix the generations, everyone enjoys it.

Singing for Pleasure has been improved by the addition of seven men, and we are now attempting to sing in harmony, which is not easy for people who cannot read music. Our music teacher/pianist is a very patient lady, who knows how to get results. Several members once thought they couldn't sing but now find they can.

We are very interested in the progress of Solihull Village at the junction of Stratford Road and Haslucks Green Road. It too is an Extra Care village (opening in Spring 2021) and will have the same amenities as we have here. If anyone is interested, I can thoroughly recommend it. Marian Batten

PEACE BE WITH YOU!

'Peace be with you' is a familiar phrase for many Christians. Sharing the peace usually takes place before Communion. We take the hands of other members of the congregation, look at one another and say, 'Peace be with you'. Passing the peace to one another is a tradition rooted in Scripture, which embodies our Christian desire to be peacemakers.

From the beginning Christians have exercised this practice. 'Peace be with you' is a greeting Jesus used to greet his disciples (Luke 24:36; John 20:19, 26). The apostle Paul opened each of his letters with the words "Grace and peace be with you" (Rom. 1:7; 1 Cor. 1:3; 2 Cor. 1:2). Luke 24:36: "While they were still talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, 'Peace be with you.'"

John 20:19: "On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you!' John 20:21: 'Again Jesus said, 'Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you.' With these words Jesus clearly intended the peace – His peace; the peace of God – to be passed on to other people.

When translated from the Greek, the greeting suggests that Jesus is not only wishing the apostles peace, but also reminding them of their duty to be fair and just with others. It is a reminder that we must not judge others and thereby cause distress and disharmony. God is their judge - not us! So instead we must be peace givers among all. It is our Christian duty to actively build harmony where there is dissonance, as the famous Franciscan prayer reminds us: 'Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love.'

Peace and love needs to be exercised outside our own church community, as well as within. I have never used 'Peace be with you', as a greeting in the street or in the home with visitors. But for the month of November [which contains Remembrance Day] I intend to start a new pattern and pass the peace to strangers and friends alike. I will start on the buses – I love riding on buses and I always thank the driver and say 'God bless you', as I alight. But in November I will thank them for the journey and then give the Christian words, 'Peace be with you'. I'll take it from there – maybe use it after being served in shops.

Might you like to try this idea too and thus spread the peace? I hope so! 'Happy are those who work for peace. God will call them his children' - from the Beatitudes, Matthew 5 v9.

AWAY DAY

The theme for our Away Day in October this year was 'A church Between'. We looked at our own situation in light of the seven churches addressed in the second and third chapters of Revelation in the Bible. We looked at the circumstances that those churches found themselves between such as geographically important places, culture, religious thought, and history, and then then applied them to ourselves and how that might impact the way we 'do' church and mission.

I will tell you about our look at the seven churches another time but here you can read about our introductory discussion for the day.

I asked in what ways we are a church between. We broke up into small groups to discuss this point and then came back together to hear what was said. How do these things affect us as 'church'?

We discussed how our church building is between Solihull Town Centre and residential areas. We are between being three separate churches and still not quite one united church as some still identify themselves with, and associate with people from, the churches that once were. We are a church between ministers. We talked about how our discussions for new buildings place us in a position between having a church complex suitable for the world of the 1960's and having a structure suitable for today's needs and expectations. We are a church between the church governance model of 'one leader leading from the front' and a 'ministry of all believers' which is the only model of church which is bearing fruit in our country today. We have work to do on this.

Solihull is located between the city and countryside. We are in a period of history where our country is shifting from a 'Christian World View' to 'post-modernism'. We are in a period where our country is shifting from a kind of unity to being divided—particularly with reference to Brexit and potentially Scottish independence. We mentioned our position in the range between conservatism and liberal thought and theology.

Some of these are modern day equivalents to the issues the early church were facing. We went on to look at what Jesus had to say into those circumstances. These things are what make us unique as a church. We need to celebrate and make the most of our uniqueness. None of these are excuses but are a context that we need to notice, and work with, as we go about our business which is making disciples. **Linda Faber**
