WORSHIP DURING OCTOBER

It is good to be back in church. However due to the current infection rate in Solihull and the potential for further increases in cases as we move into autumn, we ask that you adhere to the following Covid 19 restrictions even though these may be stricter than the law requires. We recognise that many will have been double vaccinated but that doesn't, in itself, stop the spread of the disease.

The Elders have decided that we should continue with some steps to mitigate the further spread of the virus. Basically for our services during October this means:

- please sign in (either by using the NHS track and trace App or at the desk by the entrance)
- please use the hand sanitiser provided or wash your hands
- social distancing rules should be followed with no more than 6 people or 2 households grouping together indoors.
- Communal Singing: we have a large spacious building and as long as you are socially distanced and, ideally, wearing a mask then please feel free to sing along with the hymns

We will continue to offer the service via Zoom for those who are unable to get to Church or still feel uncomfortable about attending.

We appreciate that there can be technical difficulties at times, particularly, with sound quality but we keep experimenting to resolve these issues. Life is a continual learning curve! It is also our intention to serve tea and coffee at the end of the service subject to having sufficient volunteers to prepare the drinks.

FOREWORD

*“Praise ye the Lord. Praise the Lord, O my soul. While I live will I praise the Lord: I will sing praises unto my God while I have any being.” –
Psalm 146*

How is your praying going? Are you guilty of just going through the motions or feel that your prayer will not make any difference to global situations?

Prayer is of course a very personal thing and I hope we all still regard it as one of the most effective things that we can do as Christians. I have heard it said that there is no need to pray, as the Lord always knows what is in our mind and soul. I refute that. It is not a perfect analogy, there never is, but to my mind it's a bit like loving someone deeply but never telling them.

As Ian wrote last month, “Thank you” is the shortest and simplest prayer and we should all be capable of that at any time and anywhere. My prayers of thanks normally exceed my prayers of request on a ratio of 10:1. This year it has been more like 50:50 with Fiona's surgery and subsequent chemotherapy.

Many years ago when our daughters were just little girls I attended a Thursday evening prayer session led by our then Minister, Wilfred Biggs. What I took from that meeting was that apparently you could pray for absolutely anything you wanted! Well, that was it. Eight score draws please for those who remember life before the Lottery. Needless to say they did not materialise and “needless” is probably where that prayer should be parked.

Curiously, that same Saturday we went to the Donkey Derby in Shirley where there was a stand offering a goldfish if you could throw a ping pong ball into an angled bucket and keep it there. With a bit of spin on

the old thumb I succeeded, much to the annoyance of the stallholder but to the absolute delight of two little daughters who leapt into my arms. As my ears grew like a donkey, I realised that I had already won the equivalent of the football coupon. It did, however, cost me a proper bowl and a replacement after a week but my girls' enjoyment was well worth it. I see now, incidentally, that the authorities in Bristol are going to ban the practice of giving away a goldfish in a poly bag. Not before time.

At that same Thursday evening prayer meeting Wilfred asked for suggestions for the theme of the coming Sunday's sermon. He accepted a request for unanswered prayer. I have personally experienced this twice in my life and did not handle it graciously but on both occasions my faith was strengthened by the events of the following Easter.

I do not think there is any better example of faith and acceptance of unanswered prayer than the inscription I saw on a headstone in the War Graves Commission Cemetery at Orvieto in central Italy. I visited it with my cousin Iain Laurie in 2014. Our fathers, sons of Nairn, both fought their way up through Italy and both survived World War Two, unlike the 190 who fell at Orvieto in June 1944.

We were there on the 70th anniversary of the battle with two weeks to go before the action that took their lives. The following inscription on one of the headstones will always remain with me:

GOD CALLED YOU HOME
SO YOU MAY REST
I LOVED YOU DEARLY
BUT HE KNEW BEST

All the inscriptions are in the same vein but some headstones have none and I can understand that.

Obviously unanswered prayer can only come after prayer and I maintain that it would have served no purpose to have not prayed in the first instance. So, a fear of not having your prayers answered is not a recipe for avoiding prayer in the first place. Yes, our Lord knows what you are thinking and yes he will always be at our side, regardless, but please pray with all your heart and soul and do it with gusto. I pray that your most frequent prayer will be "Thank You".

CHRISTIAN PERSECUTION IS A GLOBAL REALITY

At least 340 million Christians around the world experience systematic discrimination, unfair treatment and persecution. That means 1 in 8 Christians are affected by 'extreme', 'very high' or 'high' levels of persecution in 74 countries.

Open Doors assembles a list of the top 50 where there is the most extreme persecution and asks us to pray for them.

This month: Libya

There is no freedom of speech, no freedom of religion, and no possibility of public church in Libya.

Though there are around 34,500 Christians in the country, only a tiny number (approximately 150) are Libyan—the majority are migrant workers.

Libyan Christians from a Muslim background face violent and intense pressure from their family and the wider community to renounce their faith. They are also vulnerable to abduction, murder or sexual assault by Islamic militant groups and organised crime groups.

Pray

- For Libyan Christians under immense pressure to know God's peace.
- That new and isolated believers will find faith others to share with and learn from.
- For those in power in Libya. Pray for peace and stability, and for an end to the proxy civil war.

FLAVOUR OF THE MONTH

This easy one-pot dish is packed with flavour and its low fat too.



CHICKEN AND CHORIZO JAMBALAYA

Serves 4.

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 2 Chicken Breasts
- 1 Onion thinly sliced
- 1 Red Pepper
- 2 Garlic cloves crushed
- 75g/2.5oz chorizo sliced
- 1 tbsp Cajun Seasoning
- 250g/9oz long-grain rice
- 400g can plum tomatoes
- 350ml/12fl oz chicken stock

Heat the oil in a large frying pan with a lid and brown the chicken for five to eight minutes until golden.

Remove and set aside.

Tip in the onion and cook for three to four minutes until soft.

Add the pepper, garlic, chorizo and Cajun seasoning, and cook for five minutes more.

Stir the chicken back in with the rice and add the tomatoes and stock.

Cover and simmer for 20-25 mins until the rice is tender.

Enjoy.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND COP26 – UPDATE

Please see an update on the climate change correspondence with Julian Knight MP, this has been provided by Christine Evans.

Dear Julian Knight,

Thank you for your reply dated 22nd July. We are sorry we were unable to meet in person but are grateful for your promise to take forward some questions and suggestions.

We believe success at COP26 is critical to avoiding a global catastrophe. We commend the Government for the progress it has made, its commitment to \$100M/yr climate finance, and the amount of cross-party support (which we believe essential) achieved so far, but we believe success requires the UK not only to demonstrate practical routes to net zero emissions but having actual commitments in place. An addendum follows but we would ask you particularly to call upon government to make 4 major policy changes:

Move to a post-consumerist economy: Current political success is measured by 'standard of living', GDP, the quantity of 'stuff' and services we can buy. Life can be far more balanced than that. Much advertising accelerates demand, offering doubtful promises and generating dissatisfaction. This advertising 'hype' at least should be banned.

Steadily shift taxation onto carbon: A shift of taxation over, say, 10 years, would give time for households to adopt lower carbon lifestyles like moving closer to schools, using public transport more, flying less and so on. A carbon import duty, to stop home industry being undercut by imports, would be an advantage (the EU are already developing this¹) and could lead to the benefit of repatriating industry and more home food production.

Re-measure GHG emissions: The figure should be those the UK is responsible for not just emitted here. It should include international flights and shipping, and embedded carbon from imports, less exports. Estimated figures would be better than none at all.

Adopt a population policy: Population multiplies environmental harm and cannot be ignored. Couples should be encouraged to 'Stop at 2' with schools and maternity services advancing the message and easy access to contraceptive information and technology be the norm. Girls' education and family planning should be protected parts of UK aid.

TALKING JESUS—WHAT CAN I DO? PART 4

'Talking Jesus' is a handbook reporting a major piece of research about the Christian faith in this country conducted on behalf of the Church of England, Evangelical Alliance and HOPE. Here is some information from it.

How have people come to know Jesus?

God works in people's lives in so many ways, and each of us has our own story of how we came to faith in Jesus. For adult practicing Christians, many of whom may have come to faith as children, 41% attribute coming to faith with growing up in a Christian family.

As we are praying for those we know to come to know Jesus, let's be open to the different ways he might be working in their lives and drawing them towards himself.

How do practicing Christians describe their journey to faith in Jesus?

15% say there was one sudden decision or experience. 18% say there were several key decisions or experiences over time. Nearly a quarter (23%) say there was a journey or process over time. the largest group of 41% grew up in a Christian family. 2% describe their journey in another way.

What helps people find faith?

The survey asked practicing Christians which factors most positively influenced them in coming to faith (they could select the top two or three). 41% said they grew up in a Christian family and that was the biggest influence on them. 36% said having conversations was the key to them coming to faith. 28% attended a standard (not special occasion) church service. 27% reported reading the Bible as important in their journey to faith. 24% had an experience of the love of Jesus. 17% had an unexplained spiritual experience.

What does this mean for me?

Conversations are one of the top influences on people coming to faith—so it's clear that talking about Jesus is really important. Do you feel prepared to have something to say about Jesus to your friends, neighbours, colleagues or children? Sharing your story of the difference Jesus makes in your life is a great way to start.

- The Bible is the other key influence for adults and young people. Let's also be prepared with materials to give people—not underestimating the power of God's Word.
- We can also be intentional about offering an invitation—invite people to church services and events where they can encounter Jesus.
- Let's also be encouraged to pray for people, that they might experience Jesus' love for themselves.

From Linda—I have lots of brief leaflets in the office on loads of topics. If you want to come and look at them for some that you might find useful to give away, please come and see me.
