#### TOWARDS A THEOLOGY OF CHURCH GROWTH

Continuing through the book 'Towards a theology of Church growth' this month we look at chapter 6 titled 'Incarnation and church growth' by Martin Warner. I will share a few paragraphs that caught my attention and some questions about how we might think about, and use, what we read.

"In today's culture, driven by consumerism and the market economy, if you are not attracting the numbers, it's likely that you are not connecting with the market. Here is a serious challenge for all Christians. We are not being realistic, or faithful, if we simply seek to live in a bubble that is self-defined and deluded, talking to ourselves about our faith, and failing to connect with anyone else."

# QUESTION FOR SOLIHULL URC: Are we connecting with those outside the church well enough? How could we be more effective?

"Four convictions which are foundational to the topic of Incarnation and church growth:

First, church growth is always about Jesus. He is our constant point of reference. He is, uniquely, the way to the Father, the one to whom the Spirit leads, the revelation of our true identity. He is our life; our 'merciful redeemer, friend, and brother'.

Second, I wish to assert that, for the Church today, numbers do matter. If we close our minds to the pressing issue of attracting new people into the company of believing Christians, we have failed the Lord we serve. Jesus still invites us to 'make disciples of all nations'.

Third, I want to be clear that concern about numbers must not be driven by a desire for power – 'success' in the terms of this world and its commercial criteria. Our concern about numbers must be driven by

love in all its divine, eternal, triune fullness and beauty. That is the only motivation for the Mission of God. 'God so loved the world' is a statement of worship, adoration, and the mandate for Christian service. It must always be that, not a health warning to out detractors and those not yet in our pews. God desires 'not the death of a sinner, but rather that he may turn from his wickedness and live'.

Fourth, I believe that Christianity is the best outworking there is of human life and love within creation."

QUESTION FOR SOLIHULL URC: What thoughts and practical ideas come to mind when you read these 4 convictions?

#### **Stuart Mills**

#### **SOLIHULL TREE WARDENS – MEET THE CHAIR**

Ian Mills is a volunteer Tree Warden for Solihull and Chair of the group. As autumn often shows trees in their best colours, we asked Ian about his work.

# How did you become a Tree Warden Ian, and what does the role entail?

Fate: My Elderly in-laws lived within a close community in Yardley Wood, Birmingham. Within their neighbourhood there was an Ash tree. A focal point in the vicinity that supported a lot of the areas eco system. I.E. Birds, squirrels, etc. One resident, because of the tree's leaf fall that happened to go into his garden, succeeded in getting the tree felled. Thus, from that moment on there was a large decline in the number of birds etc. that visited the residents' gardens. Felling that tree caused a lot of resentment and from that time on a slow social decline began in that area.

Soon afterwards I read an article (Fate had it that the article's author had the same name as mine: Ian Mills), that said Solihull council was asking for volunteers to start and introduce a National Tree Council Tree Warden scheme, for people to be aware of and encourage others to look after and "warden" Solihull's Trees.

With what happened to the Ash tree and the "upset and environmental loss" it caused afterwards and with the saying, that "You don't know what you've got until it's gone", I decided to be a Warden to "stand up" for my local trees and to try to encourage others to appreciate how much trees are needed in our communities.

Presently the Wardens are carrying out Tree identification walks with the public around the different park spaces of Solihull, sharing their Tree Wardens knowledge with others.

### Why are trees so important in our environment?

Apart from supporting wildlife, they help remove carbon from the atmosphere. Trees can produce a wellbeing feeling into an urban environment.

Do you have a favourite tree and if so, what is it that appeals to you?

Wellingtonia/Giant Sequoia, Sequoiadendron giganteum. Its height and size, its soft bark and its history. It was named after the Cherokee Indian Sequoyah, who created a syllabary so that the Cherokees could write their own language. "He stood tall and led the way".

Here in Solihull, and across other parts of the West Midlands and Warwickshire, were part of the original "Forest of Arden". How do you think that legacy has affected our trees?

I think over time The Forest of Arden has been eroded away for housing etc, and to someone one in the suburbs it is only a place on an old map. More is needed to re-establish the forest before it is confined to the history books.


