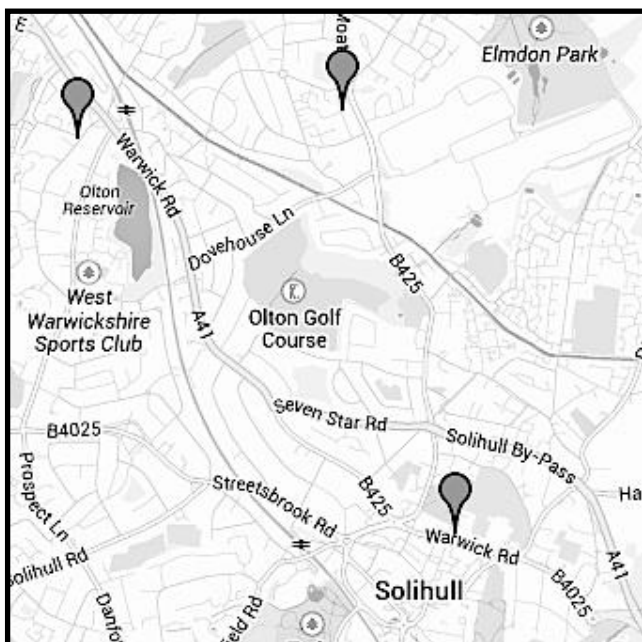

CHRIST IS RISEN! - Don't look back

A recent article posted on the URC Ministers' Facebook Page offered the view of "a Millennial Pastor - Leaders who do not remember the glory days", presenting a perspective on church life that is not about looking back or mourning the passing of the church most of us grew up in. There is a generation of ministers for whom the memory of full churches with lots of children is non-existent and for whom a vision for what God is about with his church of today is what inspires them.

As a united congregation, I trust that we have been seeking the Lord's direction and purpose for us in a new era, but I am also aware that we have continued to 'suffer the loss' in various ways. Easter carries God's message in Christ that death is past and all that lies ahead is his rich promise of new life. For the Apostles life was not the same. It was not a life without Jesus, for he rose from the dead and assured them of his constant presence through the Holy Spirit. For us too, as we move to a different future, Jesus is our constant presence with his promise of new and abundant life.

The story of Acts shares the struggles of the earliest churches with the practices of their Jewish ancestry and the tensions between the rule of law and God's grace. The ongoing story of the Christian Church across history is one of setting behind and putting to death those things that are not of God, in order to grasp all that God is laying before. Thankfully, the Crusades are far behind us and the darker sides of the missionary movement, coloured by Western culture as much as Christian faith is understood for what it was. Today, we face a largely indifferent

culture and hostility in many parts of the world, but we are as assured as the early church of the gifts and strength of the Holy Spirit, leading us in fresh pathways of faith.

As we celebrate Resurrection it is not a new life for our memories of the past, but a new life of trusting that Jesus will be with us through the strange territory that is the future.

FLOWERS FOR CHURCH - AND IN MY SACRED SPACE AT HOME

In the past I have sometimes wondered to myself why we spend money on buying flowers each week for church, when surely it would be better to give this money to a charity. 'What would Jesus think', I wonder? Perhaps we should do without this weekly indulgence in church?

Make no mistake I absolutely love flowers. I spent 30 years of my life teaching people to paint in a botanically accurate way. My students and I peered through microscopes at the centres and details of flowers. We even marvelled over leaves – yes leaves – they are amazing in their own right especially under magnification. Photosynthesis; light energy for the plant, is taken in through leaves. Plants need light for life! We too need light from the sun to see – but also the light of God for our souls. Plants and flowers have their significance for our spiritual needs.

I spent a couple of years producing my book 'Embroideries from an English garden'. I tried to balance the idea of drawing botanically accurate flower designs through the seasons with the need for simplification - so people could actually embroider flowers that look natural and beautiful. So you see I do really love flowers. Frequently I say that 'I only need to look at the centre of a flower under a microscope, or even with the naked eye, to believe in God'. Who else but God could produce these marvels and He has given us flowers for joy, through His own grace and love for us.

So I should have known myself better when I initially thought that, in my sacred worship space at home, I wouldn't indulge myself by having fresh flowers. For a week or two it had some silk flowers – very pretty and they never need watering. But

they didn't feel right. I didn't feel right. My sacred space needed real flowers as well as the Bible for me to be happy. And I do still give money to charity I hasten to add.

Flowers are a way for me to thank God for the wonders of His creation. As I read my Bible I can often smell the flowers beside me – and they remind me of church of course. For nearly 70 years I have worshipped in churches decorated with flowers. Every morning the first place I go to is my sacred space – and the smell of the flowers and sight of the open Bible on its stand greet me. 'Good morning Lord!' I say cheerfully, as I greet my heavenly Father. Whether it is the sight of the lovely flowers or the lure of reading my Bible again that draws me into my sacred space at home several times a day, I know not. I pray there frequently too, drawing in the perfume as I speak to the Lord. And the sight of the colourful flowers reminds me just how lucky I am to live in God's wonderful world!

BIBLE BOOKMARKS

My fascination with Bible bookmarks began back in my teens when, every year in Christian Unity Week, the nuns at my convent school would give us a bookmark for our Bibles or school hymn books. The bookmark had a printed prayer for Christian unity, which was read out in our daily school assemblies.

I loved these bookmarks. I can see them now in my mind's eye as they satisfied, just a little, my envy [oh dear the sin of envy!] of my Roman Catholic friends' colourful bookmarks in their hymn books. They were paper ones with pictures of saints and more prayers or else information about the saints. Some of the bookmarks were shaped like a cross. I still have my catholic hymn book from those days – but alas not the bookmarks which is frustrating.

Nowadays I read my Bible daily – often several times a day, in my Sacred Space at home. So once again I felt the need for Bible bookmarks. Quite often there are several readings which I am studying and I want to refer to them easily.

Thanks to gazing at the two long ribbon bookmarks draped between the pages of the Bible, on the magnificent eagle lectern at St Margaret's Church Olton, I've also become fascinated with liturgical colours. So I decided to make some ribbon bookmarks for my home Bible, in colours to suit the Christian festivals and seasons.

I've always loved ribbons – many people recognise me easily from behind due to my hair ribbons which control the curly locks! So off I went to Acock's Green to buy ribbons – what a change from buying food! I decided to decorate the ends of my ribbon bookmarks with ribbon roses and ribbon embroidery.

But you could just as easily use the ribbons without adornment. How colourful and interesting the Bible looks, with its hanging ribbons – try it! I think you'll find Bible bookmarks really useful. Your Bible may already have one integral bookmark but you can always add more. They make the Bible readings and stories so easy to find – and buying ribbon for bookmarks is not expensive you'll be pleased to know - so you can indulge yourself! Enjoy! WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER
